Manchester Board of Education Personnel & Finance Committee Report September 11, 2017

Attendees: Committee Members Ranon Caldwell, Deborah Hagenow, Neal Leon, Darryl Thames, Sr.

Also in attendance: Board of Education Member Superintendent Matthew Geary and Director of Finance & Management Karen Clancy

Mrs. Clancy reviewed the 2016-2017 End of Year Financial Report and Budget Transfers. The end of year transfers are approved by the Board of Education. The Board of Education ended the year with a balance of \$96,873.96 which will remain in the Town's General Fund. Administration also shifted salaries from the Board of Education budget to year 2 of the IDEA grant in order to provide an additional \$219,228.89 to the Town. This represents a total of \$316,102.85 and was done in response to the commitment by Mr. Geary and the Board of Education to return money to the Town of Manchester to offset State budget reductions. Mr. Thames asked what vehicles were purchased by the Board in 2016-2017. Mrs. Clancy responded that two vehicles were purchased and that she will provide the specifics to Board members.

Mrs. Clancy provided the committee with an update on the current budget stating that, unfortunately, there is not much to report at this time due to the unknown status of the State budget. There has not been a final budget released at this time therefore we are still unsure of the Alliance funding. She explained that funds have been frozen and encumbered to cover the first quarter salaries of those employees paid from the Alliance Grant. Mr. Leon asked how many employees are paid from Alliance. Mr. Geary responded there are approximately 30-40 employees paid from the Grant. Mrs. Clancy stated that updates will be shared with Board members as information becomes available.

Mrs. Clancy distributed a draft copy of the 2018-2019 Budget Development Calendar. She reviewed the information stating that the timeline mirrors previous years. Mr. Geary stated that due to school consolidation and the need to present a low budget increase for next year, we may need to look at an early retirement incentive. We will discuss this at the next Personnel & Finance Committee meeting scheduled for November.

Mrs. Clancy provided an update on transportation services. She reminded Board members that a contract was awarded to Dattco mid-June which gave them approximately 10 weeks to establish themselves in Manchester, coordinate routes, hire drivers and be ready for the September 6th start of school. They have made hundreds of changes to the routes and continue to handle daily requests. Mrs. Clancy stated that as of today, Day 4 of school, the buses were all cleared at 4:35 p.m. which is exceptional. She also said that Dattco Management has been on-site at the schools to observe pick up and drop off service. Dattco has been professional, responsive and customer

service oriented. The transition has not been perfect, but Dattco continues to work hard to provide us with great service. Mr. Leon stated that he had only received one complaint this year which is less than usual. Mr. Geary stated that he also has received less complaints than normal.

Mrs. Clancy explained to the committee that Administration has received numerous requests from staff that they be allowed to set up GoFundMe pages or Donors Choose options to raise funds for school related purchases. Mrs. Clancy stated that she surveyed other districts to see whether they allow this or not. She received responses from 11 districts; 7 do not allow, 2 allow with Superintendent/Board approval, 1 allows it without district involvement and 1 is working on it. Mrs. Clancy also stated that she spoke with legal counsel who said that there are concerns with these types of situations. There are equity concerns where one classroom or one school is able to raise more money than another. Also, school districts are required by law to provide basic instructional materials for students and that employees do not have the right to solicit funds on behalf of the school district without approval. Mrs. Clancy also said that there are concerns with the administration of these funds. There was a suggestion that outside organizations handle these types of donation opportunities. Mr. Geary will bring this to the Policy Committee.

The next Personnel & Finance Committee meeting will be held on Monday, November 13, 2017, at 5:30 p.m., at Highland Park School.

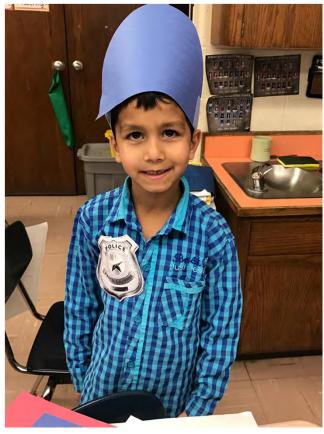

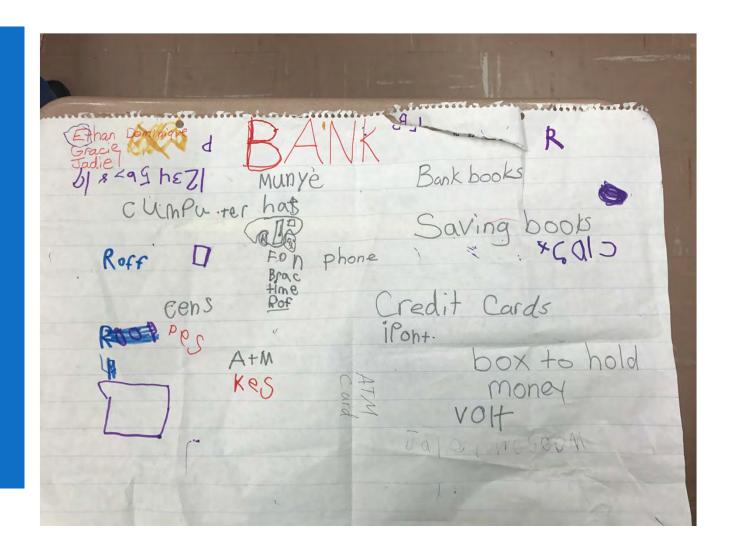
